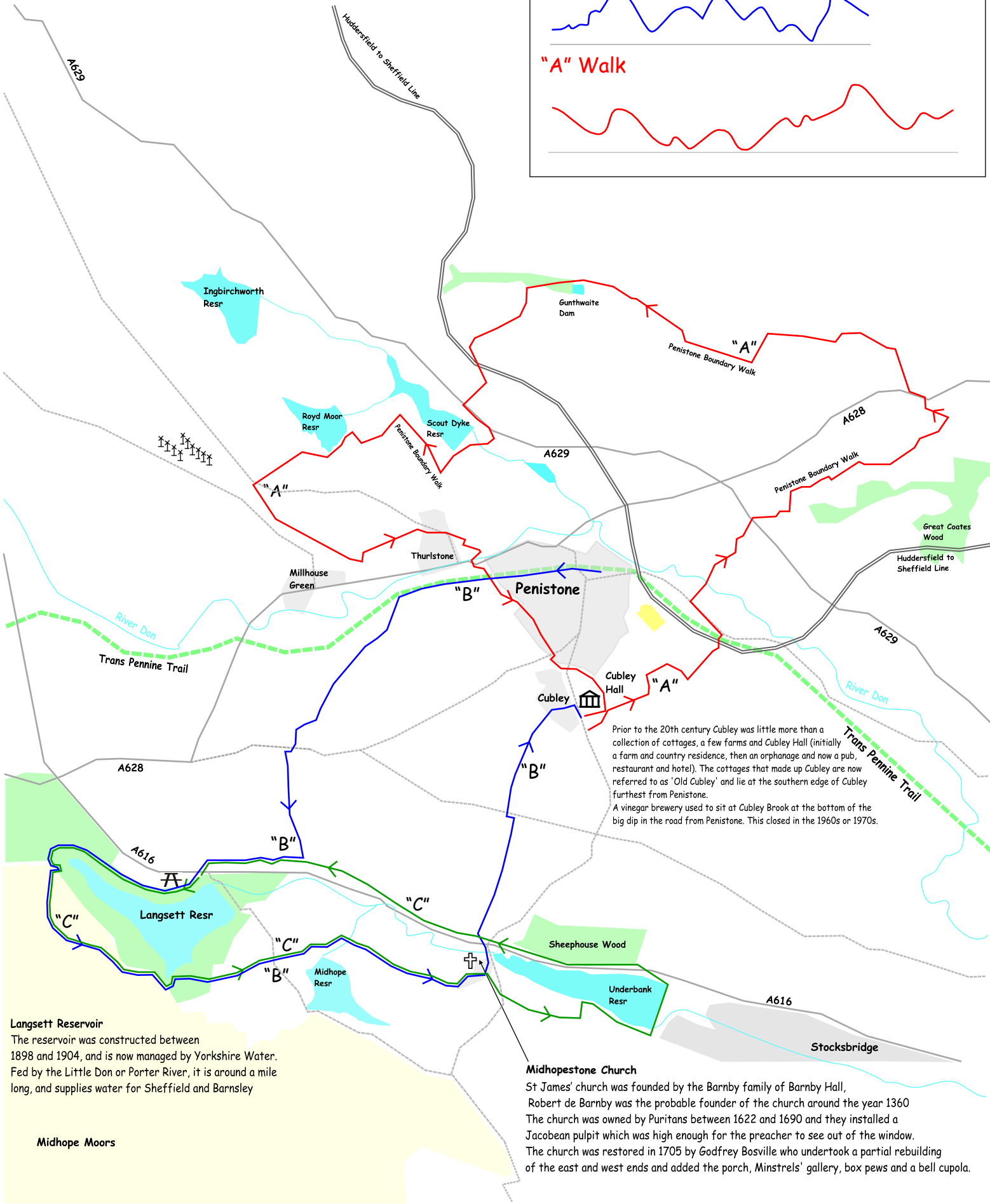
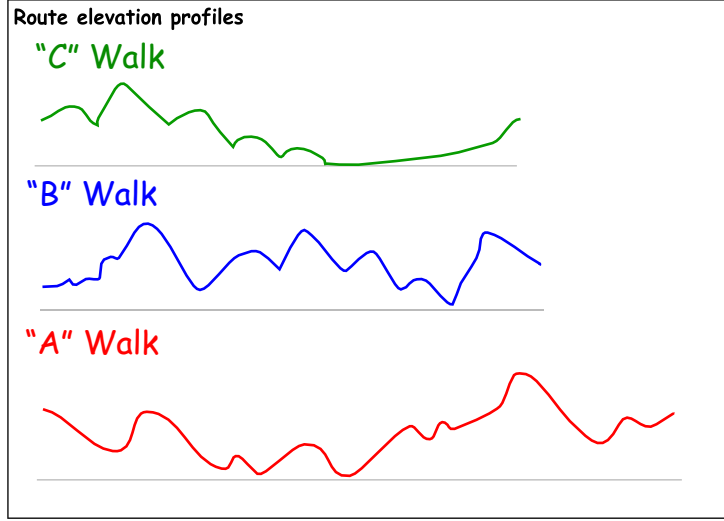


Penistone is located at the foot of the Pennines and is surrounded by beautiful and historic landscape which is well worth exploring on the ground, Several pre-19th Century buildings still survive, the oldest being the Grade I listed medieval parish church, Saint John the Baptist Church; the White Hart pub in the town dates from 1377 and the secondary school, established in 1342 is said to be one of the oldest in the country.



Prior to the 20th century Cubley was little more than a collection of cottages, a few farms and Cubley Hall (initially a farm and country residence, then an orphanage and now a pub, restaurant and hotel). The cottages that made up Cubley are now referred to as 'Old Cubley' and lie at the southern edge of Cubley furthest from Penistone. A vinegar brewery used to sit at Cubley Brook at the bottom of the big dip in the road from Penistone. This closed in the 1960s or 1970s.

Langsett Reservoir
The reservoir was constructed between 1898 and 1904, and is now managed by Yorkshire Water. Fed by the Little Don or Porter River, it is around a mile long, and supplies water for Sheffield and Barnsley

Midhopestone Church
St James' church was founded by the Barnby family of Barnby Hall, Robert de Barnby was the probable founder of the church around the year 1360 The church was owned by Puritans between 1622 and 1690 and they installed a Jacobean pulpit which was high enough for the preacher to see out of the window. The church was restored in 1705 by Godfrey Bosville who undertook a partial rebuilding of the east and west ends and added the porch, Minstrels' gallery, box pews and a bell cupola.
